Before class Basketball, all Indiana high school basketball players practiced hitting the game winning shot in the closing seconds against the likes of South Bend Central, Gary Roosevelt or Lafayette Jeff in the State Final. A lot of those shots were practiced in barn hay mows across Indiana.

Barns would be stuffed with bales of hay to the rafters. Backboards and rims yielded their function to the need for storage and so were covered with layers of sweet-smelling hay. Baskets lay dormant until the cows could eat enough so bales could be excavated to free up space for this season’s challenges. That space was excavated in a stair-step type “V” from the Backboard to the floor 15’ feet away.

Since Jack was able to free up his backboard and rim first he and I were challenging each other on those last second free-throws when his (nearly three year old) nephew peaked his head through that big old beam-barn ladder. He wanted to play ball too. (How he got up there is still a mystery to me because it was a challenge for my 5’5” frame. I guess great desire and determination with focus mixed with perseverance led him to accomplish his goal).

Anyway, he wanted to put the ball in the basket like Uncle Jack. I picked him up and climbed the bales up to the basket and held him so he could take that big ball from Jack and put it in the basket.

Jack made a big deal out of it. That little squirt laughed and giggled and said “Again.” Each time the ball went into the basket Jack would have a different and funny reaction and his nephew would laugh even harder and say “Again.” This went on for quite a while until I got tired.

I would like to think that Jack and I gave little Scotty the love for basketball in Ross’s barn back then, but it was probably already in his genes from his mom and dad, Marilyn(Ross) and Rick Skiles.

1st round draft pick, 22nd. Played 10 years in the NBA. He still holds the NBA record for assists in one game at 30 during his 2nd season with the Orlando Magic. Coached NBA Teams from 1997 to 2016.

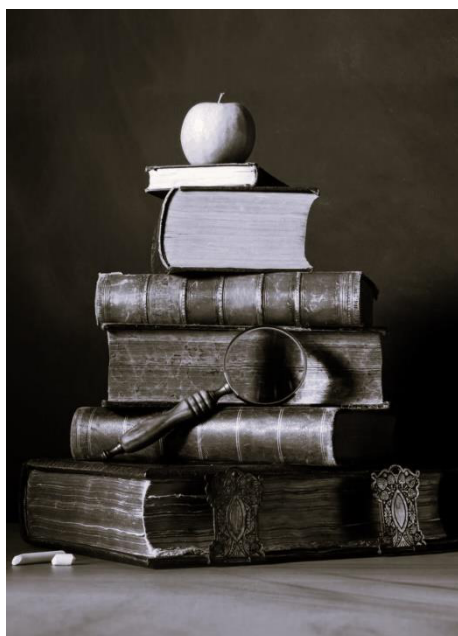

A few months ago I acquired some unusual original Tyner memorabilia dated 1909 and 1913 from Nancy Ferris (Nancy's Beauty Salon). Her Grandmother, Alice Bolenbaugh graduated in 1909, I believe. There are some onion-skin type papers with classes and grades listed by Frank, Polk Twp. Trustee, at the time. In the early years the Tyner School was referred to as Polk Twp. School. At that time, I think students may have only gone through 8th grade. Indiana passed a law in 1909 until 1920 that had many more requirements for public schools in Indiana. Her pretty graduation announcement has an embossed cover with nice green cording. My mother, Wilma Winrotte Martin, attended an Indiana Normal Teachers College, which only required 2 years of education to teach.

The first Tyner THS Alumni was held on 5/3/1913, with a program listing the menu for the evening. I have framed the two different years and many associated miscellaneous items in two gold frames to donate to the Tyner Alumni. It is my hope if the Tyner Alumni no longer exists, that these framed pictures would go to the Marshall Country Historical Society. I am very glad to do what I can to continue the legacy of our beloved school, which has been closed for more than 50 years.

HAROLD (HAL) MUNCIE EULOGY

Harold Rubert Muncie (Hal; Monk; Buppy; Papa) went to be with the Lord December 27, 2023, at 1:06 PM peacefully at home in Gardner, Kansas. Hal was born December 4th, 1929, in Madison, IN to Emery Ozro and Eunice Pauline (Teaford) Muncie, during the great depression. He was the youngest of three children, including his sister, Mary Eunice, and brother, Emery Teaford. As a child he enjoyed his two dogs Prince and Chum, playing second base in softball, center in basketball, high jump in track, and serving as a lifeguard at the Madison public pool where he saved a little girl's life. He enjoyed listening to the Kentucky Derby and Indy 500 on the radio and sitting on the banks of the Ohio River watching the Madison Regatta boat races. Hal recalled the Ohio River flood of 1936-1937 where he and his dad floated on a little boat through the water-filled halls of the Madison schools, forever remembering there was, "No school for seven months!" Hal became a New York Yankees fan at the age of eight when he applied to be a Yankee bat boy. He saved Wheaties boxes with famous NYY players on them and still spoke of the day his mom used his Lou Gherig box for cardboard and ironed over it. Music caught his interest at a young age, and he enjoyed singing throughout his entire life.

Hal graduated from Madison High School in 1948, and often spoke with a smile of his high school basketball years wearing #7. He the pivotman, and his team went on to the state championship. After graduation he was off to DePauw University in Greencastle, IN where he joined Lambda Chi Alpha, was part of the athletic basketball program, and coached the freshman basketball team before graduating in 1952 with his Bachelor of Arts. Later Hal went on to Indiana University to receive his Master of Science in Education in 1959.

In September of 1952 Hal was drafted into the 3rd Infantry division of the Army and set sail for 34 days from New York through the Panama Canal to Japan. He was a Corporal in the Korean War, serving for two years in the US Army Signal Corps as a teletype communications operator. While serving, Hal met the newly married Joe DiMaggio and Marilyn Monroe when they came to entertain the troops. The military wanted him to stay on and become a sergeant, but he wanted to come home and start the next chapter of his life.

After accepting the position of Head Basketball Coach at Tyner High School in September of 1954, Hal moved to Northern Indiana and rented a boarding room at Koontz Lake. Shortly thereafter, Carole Holmquist, the previous year's drum majorette, came to his office under the guise of, "returning the band whistle," and the rest is history. That lucky whistle is still tied to Hal and Carole's wedding album. They were married the next Spring, on June 5th of 1955. Hal went on to coach and teach at Tyner High School for nine years, becoming the principal from 1963-1965. Hal also spoke with excitement about meeting Jesse Owens while serving as President of the Marshall County Teachers' Association. During this time, he and Carole adopted a son Robert Kevin and daughters Karla Marie and Kristine Joan. In the Spring of 1965 Hal was appointed the Principal of the Walkerton High School. In 1968 a new high school was built, and that fall Astronaut John Glenn was in attendance for the dedication ceremony for the new John Glenn High School. In June of 1972, Hal was named Superintendent of PLJ School Corporation. He oversaw the merger of PLJ with North Liberty, which became John Glenn School Corporation, and he served as Superintendent for an additional 12 years.

In April of 1985 Hal was named Superintendent of the Western Boone School Corporation, in Thorntown, IN where he served a very successful seven years. In late 1985 parts of the movie, "Hoosiers," were filmed on location nearby. Hal granted leave for the student body to participate as extras and he got to meet actor Gene Hackman along the way. Hal and his family attended Lebanon Bible Baptist Church. In 1990 his wife of 35 wonderful years, Carole, passed away suddenly from illness. In 1992 Hal retired after serving 38 years in the field of education.

Hal was introduced to Pat French through a mutual friend in early 1991. There was an instant connection, and they were married on October 5, 1991, in Springfield, MO. After Hal's retirement, they moved to Springfield to be closer to Pat's children and grandchildren. He and Pat regularly attended the Missouri State Lady Bear Basketball games and worked in Branson, MO at the Osmond Family Theater. They were members of the Sycamore Baptist and Park Crest Baptist churches in Springfield, MO. Pat preceded Hal in death on June 27, 2008. Hal remained in Springfield and volunteered at Mercy Hospital until 2013 when he moved to Gardner, KS.

Hal loved spending time with his family and on the lake, driving boats, and playing card games and basketball with his kids. Hal's love of music and singing would shine through when he would regale us with Take Me Out to the Ball Game, Amazing Grace, and God Bless America, and he even loved crooning Moon River in the shower with his strong, booming baritone. He had a strong interest in History: teaching; reading; visiting historical sites and cemeteries; researching genealogies, wars, and biographies; and collecting newspapers from specific days in history. He will forever be remembered as a kind, gentle man with a warm heart, and will be greatly missed by all who knew him. He was very social, encouraging, patient, sometimes teasing, and had a smile that warmed the room. He was a devoted NY Yankees fan who loved his country, friends, family, and the Lord.

Hal was preceded in death by his wife of 35 years Carole (Holmquist) Muncie. Three children: preceded in death by son Robert Muncie; survived by daughters Karla Muncie and Kristine Pardue (husband Jonathan).

Starting with the oldest graduates, each table introduced themselves and their guest. Congratulations to Joe Bottorff, Class of 1953, celebrating his 70th year graduating.

THE JIM WALLER STORY ALUMNUS OF 2023

I enjoyed visiting with Jim Waller. Two coaches, not discussing offenses and defenses but remembering the students whose lives we changed!

It's a beautiful sunny Sunday. Mom took us to Tyner EUB church. She gave me a dollar to start my journey on learning how to tithe. After church it was home for Sunday dinner and off to the Tyner School baseball diamond and Bill Waller with his bag of baseballs, hitting and catching practice.

That's the first I knew Jim Waller. Jim Waller's family moved to Tyner when he was three. I was later to meet and know a lot about the 1951 Tyner High graduate, Jim Waller. He only had 20 people in his class. He is number 14 on the leading scorers in Tyner Basketball history with 475 points. His 1950 team captured the West High Tournament. He played for Coaches Bill Brown and Leo Crabbs, and mentioned that he looked up to Norm Klinedinst and Dick Balke. Jim says, "I look back on those years with a tremendous amount of gratitude."

After graduation Jim had dreams of going to Notre Dame to college. Jim told me, "Going to Notre Dame from Tyner High School was like going from Koontz Lake to the Pacific Ocean." His nickname was "Doc" because he wanted to be a doctor. But the summer between his Junior and Senior years, after working at a summer basketball camp, he decided that he wanted to be a teacher and a coach.

There is a saying "A Teacher/Coach will influence more people in a year than most people do in their lifetime." Jim had 40 years of influence and changed lives.

A few places that Jim has coached are South Bend Central, South Bend Clay, Peru, and John Glenn High Schools.

While at John Glenn, Jim taught remedial reading. This is where Jim told me he was a kick-ass-no-nonsense teacher. Jim had learned boxing, wrestling and self-defense and he was so good. He never took a student to the office in 40 years of teaching. His best memories are of the tough kids who came into his class that he turned their lives around. Jim had an astonishing 92% graduation rate in 11 years at John Glenn. My son Ryan to this day says "Mr. Waller was my favorite teacher!"

Jim told me as we visited that he had an "outstanding life." Tonight we honor him as the "2023 Tyner High School Alumnus of the Year."
