There were 82 people attending the annual Teegarden-Tyner Days at Lorida, Florida.

A buffet lunch was catered by the Lorida Lions Club. Gene and Betty (Muffley) Burger and Ben and Vickie (Holderread) Burger greeted reunion members as they arrived at the Club. The lunch was pulled pork barbecue, chicken, sauerkraut and sausage, baked beans, potato salad, coleslaw, coffee, tea and cake for dessert. The cost was \$10.

The warrior said he discovered a beautiful canyon and felt the presence of the Great Spirit and he felt peace within himself. The Chief pondered the items and the story that each warrior told. “MISS WILMA”

Editor's Note: "Miss Wilma" was my first and second grade teacher and thus was one of the earliest and most positive influences on my young life. She passed away in August of 2010 and I'm including her obituary here for anyone who may have missed it and as a reminder that there has been a Scholarship Fund created in her name to assist a Polk Township student who is going into education as a career.

A lifetime resident of Marshall County, Wilma Mae Martin died on Tuesday, August 10, 2010, at Miller's Merry Manor in Walkerton, Indiana. Wilma Mae, born near Bremen on February 16, 1918, was the oldest of seven children born to Donald and Marie Annie Laurie Reese Winrotte. She graduated from LaPaz High School with the class of 1935. Wilma wanted to teach and was able to attend Marion College in Marion, Indiana, (now called Indiana Wesleyan University). She graduated in 1938, with a two-year Normal School Teaching Degree and a life license. This was the last year the Normal degree was awarded. On January 11, 1941, in Tyner, Wilma Mae Winrotte and Walter John Martin were married. Wilma and John owned a booth at the Farmers Market in South Bend, where they sold an extensive selection of vegetables. John died on December 31, 1995, shortly after they sold the farm. A school teacher in Tyner, Teegarden and then Walkerton Elementary, Wilma was known for her ability to teach children to read. She often had the insight and fortitude to help students who struggled the most. Parents commented she gave their son or daughter a good foundation for their education. Wilma's entire teaching career was in the same school corporation, and she sometimes taught two generations of families. Throughout their adult lives, she was called "Miss Wilma" by some of her early first graders. Wilma enjoyed collecting owls, which she displayed in the hallways. She had a lovely flower garden in earlier years. She was good at find-a-word puzzles. Wilma was an avid reader, reading both the Plymouth Pilot and the South Bend Tribune until her death, and she liked semi-love stories. Wilma was compassionate, very considerate, a hard worker and patient, with a gentle, giving heart. Wilma is survived by two daughters and a son. They are Cynthia/Cindy L. Martin, Walkerton, Indiana, Kathleen/Kathy M. (Hugh) Geren, Clearwater, Florida, and Phillip/Phil J. (Pamela) Martin, Goshen, Indiana. She is also survived by four grandchildren, Matthew, Cari Martin, Andrew (Elizabeth) Martin and Sarah (Jeremy) Dail. A great-grandchild, Hannah Martin, survives, and another great-grandchild is due in No-

Tyner Celebrates 100 Years

(Editor's Note: This article, written by Mrs. Everett Philbrook, was published in the Pilot-News on June 18, 1955 in observance of Tyner's Centennial Celebration.)

Tyner, originally planned as a college town, is 100 years old Saturday.

Earlier known as Tyner City, the town was platted June 18, 1855, by Jacob Miller, Maynard Miller and Thomas Tyner and named after the latter individual.

Tyner was incorporated the following year as a result of a feud between the townspeople and those persons residing outside its limits. The dispute was carried on to such an extent that no resident of the village could be elected to a township office. Since it was deemed desirable to have a town resident serving as justice of the peace, the only way to accomplish this was to organize under a corporation government.

This strategy was employed because the law provided that one of the justices, under this type of government, should reside within the limits of the corporation.

Incorporation provided the answer to the issue as a town resident was elected justice of the peace.

In the course of time, however, the feud gradually subsided and since there no longer appeared to be any necessity for a town government, an election was held and residents voted to disband the corporation.

Thomas Tyner, founder of Tyner City, died Oct. 18, 1880 and thus the county lost one of its most respected and honored citizens. In his earlier years Mr. Tyner assisted in moving the archives of the state government from Corydon to Indianapolis after the capital was established there.

Squire Cushman built the first home in Tyner, for many years known as the Knott house, on the site where the William Waller residence now stands. The first general store was established and managed by John C. Cushman and the first post office was started in 1869 with Baker Falconbury serving as postmaster.

In its early period of history, Tyner boasted a wooden pump factory where Dr. A. A. Thompson's house now stands, a stave factory, two cooper shops

(one where Karn's store is presently located, a blacksmith shop where Tom Miller's residence stands, a coffin factory constructed and operated by Matthias Myers, father of Ella Myers, and two brick kilns on the front lot presently owned by Everett Philbrook.

A flourishing cider mill was once operated by Lis Klingerman and it was torn down only a few years ago by the present owner of the property, Stanley Karn.

Also included in the early business life of Tyner was a wagon factory, located where the Darrel Barr home now stands, a telephone exchange which was discontinued in 1931 or 1932, and a bank which was in operation from 1920 to 1930. However the bank was closed for voluntary liquidation in 1930 due to the financial depression.

A fire in the 1930's destroyed a pickle factory built in 1902.

Early maps show the location of the college, which never materialized on what is now a pasture on Arthur Stoneburner's property.. The building was supposed to have been constructed on a knoll, directly across the street from the John Hoffer home. These same maps also show a site marked off for a hospital which is the present location of a barn on a property known as Aunt Nan Fink's.

Tyner also at one time had two saloons, one standing on the lot between Walsh's store and the railroad, and the other across the street. A man named Albert Smith was murdered by Albert Broderick in one of the saloons but Broderick was never seen after the beating. Both buildings since have burned down.

Miss Ella Myers was the first child born in Tyner in a house that was occupied by the family temporarily while the father was getting lumber for his home, located where the Harry Karn home now stands.

The community's first school was built one mile northwest of town on the Schultz farm and the first school in Tyner was a small dwelling on Main street across from John Wolf's barn. Claude York's home now stands on this site. Fred Kyser and David McDuffie were among the early teachers.

Later, school was conducted in the upper story of the pump factory in the summer and on the lower floor during the winter months. Mr. and Mrs. John Ness were listed as teachers during this period.

Oldest citizen of Tyner is John Reid who will be 90 years of age Oct 13 and Judith Huffman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Huffman, nine month old, is the youngest.

The oldest buildings still standing are the house built by Ella Myers' father, the house where Charles

Calvert lives, the home of Harold Schiffer, and the front section of the Everett Philbrook residence.

The United Brethren church was organized in Tyner in 1858 by David Ross, with a membership of 12 persons. Actually, the first religious organization in Polk township was of the Mormon faith but no church was established and it disbanded several years later.

A Methodist church was organized in 1860 with nine members and the church building was located where the Floyd Whiteleather home now stands. The church was later moved away.

Finally, a Pilgrim Holiness church was built in July, 1905, with all the materials, time and labor donated. Guy Collier was in charge of construction. Rev. Roby S(??), New Carlisle, was the circuit pastor and Rev. John W. Lee was the presiding elder. There were 10 original members.

Henry Jarrel, Watson York, Ambrose Fink, Carl Dawson and Eli Wick organized the I.O.O.F. Lodge in 1905. In the past 50 years the lodge has given more than \$800 to churches and has set aside a sum of more than \$1,000 for perpetual care of the Tyner cemetery. Three county sheriffs, Henry Jarrel, Earl Bennet and Frank Martin, have been lodge members.

At the present time, there are 53 homes within the limits of Tyner and 13 more are generally considered in Tyner proper. There are two grocery stores, one of which is also a hardware and electrical appliance store, a hardware and lumber company, garage, elevator, barber shop, printing office and a large modern 12-grade school building and two churches, the Pilgrim Holiness within the confines of Tyner , and the E.U.B. just outside the town limits.

And with the centennial observance today, the cities and towns of Marshall county join in wishing Tyner a happy 100th birthday.
